Explores how an unlikely partnership between religion and government may hold the answer to China's growing environmental crisis.

"Fight for Areng Valley"

Looks into a remote valley in Cambodia, where a group of young monks join the Chong people in a fight to protect their forests, livelihood and heritage from the looming construction of a hydroelectric dam.

Screening concludes with a panel discussion
with filmmakers **Kalyanee Mam** and **Gary Marcuse**, and author **Evan Osnos**.

Kalyanee Mam is an award-winning filmmaker. Her documentary feature *A River Changes Course* won the World Cinema Grand Jury Prize for Documentary at the 2013 Sundance Film Festival and the Golden Gate Award for Best Feature Documentary at the San Francisco International Film Festival.


Gary Marcuse is a journalist and filmmaker who has directed several films about the emergence of environmental movements around the world. He is the director of the award-winning documentary *Waking the Green Tiger*.

Evan Osnos is a staff writer at *The New Yorker* and winner of the 2014 National Book Award for "*Age of Ambition: Chasing Fortune, Truth and Faith in the New China*."
